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DNR Celebrates Recycling Excellence Award Winners In Honor Of America Recycles Day

In honor of America Recycles Day on Nov. 15, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announces the winners of the 2025 Wisconsin Recycling Excellence Awards.



For the last 13 years, the DNR has celebrated outstanding recycling and waste minimization efforts through its annual awards. In addition to giving recognition, the Recycling Excellence Awards highlight ideas and strategies with proven track records that other organizations may use to improve their recycling endeavors. This year, the DNR is recognizing 22 organizations for going beyond what is required by law.

"This year marks a new record high number of Recycling Excellence Award winners," says Jennifer Semrau, DNR waste reduction and diversion coordinator. "The number of nominations we received exemplified an outstanding commitment to recycling, upcycling, and food waste reduction."

In addition to landfill-banned items, which include curbside recyclables and electronics, the winners diverted many tons of food waste, roof shingles, plastic bags and film, propane cylinders, bicycles, and other common materials for reuse or recycling.

Awards are given in one of four categories: Projects and Initiatives, Overall Program, Special Events and Innovation.

History Of America Recycles Day



America Recycles Day (ARD) is the only nationally recognized day dedicated to encouraging Americans to recycle and buy recycled products, and is celebrated


annually on Nov. 15.

This Nov. 15 marks the 28th anniversary of ARD. Have you ever wondered how it began? America has Texas to thank for this national holiday. Texas Recycles Day started in 1994 as the brainchild of two employees of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. They chose Nov. 15 as approximately a half year after Earth Day, and a date after Election Day and before the holidays. The idea to transfer Texas Recycles Day to America Recycles Day was presented to the National Recycling Coalition (NRC), which embraced the idea.

The first national America Recycles Day was on Nov. 15, 1997. On Oct. 1, 1997, the NRC and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) co-sponsored a national press conference at the White House Conference Center, featuring Vice President Al Gore as honorary Chair for the event. The theme was "Buy Recycled," and the press conference featured a model store filled with products made from recycled content. A raffle was offered to those who signed recycling pledge cards, with the raffle winner receiving a free "American Green Dream House," a home built with recycled-content and energy-efficient products. Wisconsin Ranks Number One In The Nation During Fall Drug Take Back Collection



The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) recently announced that Wisconsin ranked number one throughout the country for the most prescription medications collected during the fall 2025 Drug Take Back collection. Wisconsin collected 53,498 lbs. of unwanted medications this fall.

"Wisconsin's continued success with Drug Take Back is really extraordinary," said Attorney General Josh Kaul.
"Thank you to the partners around the state whose efforts

have helped make this such an outstanding program in Wisconsin."

Wisconsin has collected a total of 1,422,970 pounds of unwanted medications since Drug Take Back began in 2010 under the leadership of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). Wisconsin ranks third in the nation for the most medications collected since its inception, falling only behind Texas, with 1,559,313 pounds, and California, with 1,495,633 pounds. Nationwide, since inception, 20,391,815 pounds of unwanted medications have been collected during Drug Take Back events.

The DEA leads two Drug Take Back days a year, one in the spring and one in the fall. The DOJ partners with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to organize and promote Drug Take Back throughout Wisconsin. Drug Take Back provides a safe, convenient and responsible means of disposal, while also educating the community about the potential abuse and consequences of improper storage and disposal of these medications.
